Every January, as cold winds blow and snow often falls, thousands gather in Washington DC to make a statement.

"Are we prepared to say that such violence visited on our children, year after year after year, is somehow the price of our freedom?"

Like the President said—those innocent children at Sandy Hook School had their entire lives ahead of them—birthdays, graduations, weddings, kids of their own.

So did 56 million others.

The words of Mother Teresa have much to say regarding what seems like ever-growing violence in this country:

“If we can accept that a mother can kill her own child, how can we tell other people not to kill one another?”
